Mayfest was held for many years to celebrate that day. This year is even BIGGER and BETTER! Please plan to join us!


Historic Maytown will feature these events from 10:00-3:00:

THE RING WITH A STORY

This ring, that now belongs to Deb Crankshaw Gepfer, has quite an interesting history. It was given to Deb for Christmas by her aunt, Hazel C. Deming, just this year. The original ring setting was a gold solitare, and Hazel Deming had it reset. Here is the history of the ring retold in a writing by Hazel Crankshaw, Deb's grandmother.

Maytown needed a new school building. The School Board, headed by M.R. Hoffman refused to vote to build a badly needed new school. In 1921, the township citizens had a meeting to find people to run against the current Board. Hazel's father attended the meeting and came home to inform Flora, Hazel's mother, that she would be running for school board director. He promised her a diamond ring if she ran and won. Well, she not only ran, but she won with the most votes!

Over the next 6 years, out of 72 meetings, Flora only missed 3 meetings. On May 24, 1927, a special election was held to ask for \$75,000 to purchase land and to build a new school. The town vote was a magnificent yes! The plan for the new school was now a reality. The new high school was dedicated on Saturday, March 24, 1929.

Flora left the Board at the end of 1927. She did not run for reelection, and she had her diamond ring! Deb is the fourth generation Shireman-Crankshaw to own and wear the ring!
