

Next Society Meeting

Our next meeting will be held on Thursday, October 17th at 6:00 PM at the East Donegal Township Building. Our program will be a presentation on the Underground Railroad by Hazel Crankshaw Deming, also known as "Mickey" to longtime Maytown residents. Her program will focus on the Underground Railroad in Lancaster County and whether or not there are any connections to Maytown/East Donegal Township.

Hazel is a former teacher who grew up on the corner of West High and North King Streets in Maytown. She graduated from East Donegal High School and earned degrees in Education from Elizabethtown College and Temple Uni-

versity. Hazel began her career teaching 4th grade at Maytown Elementary School and later taught 5th grade at Jenkintown Elementary School in Montgomery County for 12 years. While in Montgomery County, she also worked as Coordinator of Activities for a local retirement community and volunteered as a docent at Independence

Historical Park in Philadelphia. Upon returning to Lancaster County, she volunteered as a docent at Rock Ford and was a member of the Lancaster County Speakers

Bureau for over 10 years. She currently resides at Willow Valley in Willow Street.

Merv & Tibby's Big Secret

Merv Arnold, Maytown's future un-official "Mayor", and Elizabeth "Tibby" Lindemuth were teenagers in love, and they wanted to get married, but the law and their families thought they were too young. So what to do? They heard that people their age could get married south of the Mason-Dixon Line, without parental consent, and so they stole off to Hager-

stown, Maryland and got "hitched" by a pastor named Lytheton Ferguson.

But what to do now? They couldn't just leave their homes and families behind. They couldn't leave Maytown. They were, however, afraid to tell their parents the truth, and so they came home, lived apart from one another, pretending they were not married, and told no one their big secret for a

very long time.

The marriage, nevertheless, "took", because it lasted for 62 years, until Tibby's death in 1982, and it produced sons, Merle, Dale and Glen. Two of whom worked at Arnold's Garage and kept Merv and Tibby's legacy of secret love going across many generations.
